Further Education College

FE colleges include: Guildford, Alton, Brinsbury, Farnham, Bordon Future Skills, Brooklands, South Downs, ACM Guildford, BCOT, FCOT, Merrist Wood, Sparsholt. We have had Undershaw students go on to all of these colleges.

There are courses for everybody and at different levels: you can do Entry Level, Level 2 or Level 3 courses.

CONTEXT

At Undershaw, most of our leavers will choose to go on to Post 16 after Year 11, and most choose Further Education College after Post 16.

Some students will choose an Apprenticeship, Supported Internship, or go straight to work.

We have a wonderful Employability Team who are here to support you in deciding where you would like to go after leaving Undershaw.

Supported Internship

The aim of a supported internship is mainly a work placement, where you will be supported by an expert job coach.

Whilst you do not get paid for this work, it is a fantastic way of gaining work experience. It is often a good first step towards getting your first paid job. Many Supported Internship students from Undershaw have then gone on to be offered a job within that company.

Apprenticeship

An Apprenticeship is a chance to work and study at the same time. Most of your time is spent learning at work, and the rest is spent studying for a qualification at a college. When you are an Apprentice, you are paid the minimum wage.
