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

Employability strikes at the heart of Undershaw's vision

We have a dedicated team of specialist coaches, teachers, and pastoral assistants offering guidance and support to our students and families. Our young people benefit from targeted coaching sessions, the development of employability and life skills through qualifications, all seamlessly dovetailed with immersive social, independence and employment experiences.

I support students and families at all stages of the Undershaw experience. I have extensive relationships with our local schools, and enjoy building and maintaining our numerous partnerships with Further Education Colleges. I work extensively with students and families to explore college route options and the application process. I develop transition plans for each student and coordinate college taster days and familiarisation visits. I am also responsible for the Undershaw Alumni Association.



I take the lead on the Skills Builder Programme and coordinate it throughout the school. I support delivery of the Undershaw Diploma and I am the form tutor for our Post 16 students. I form the conduit with AQA as our Employability and Life Skills Lead.



I plan and deliver bespoke sessions and facilitate activities and opportunities for our students to develop and practice their transferable skills in real life settings. I support students and families through the transition process.

I lead on strategy and curriculum planning for the Faculty and develop the careers provision in line with Industry dynamics. I coordinate the Employability and Life Skills Programme across all faculties and support Annual Review meetings with families.

I work extensively with our strategic partners, forging new relationships with our work experience businesses and brokering connections for Undershaw within the community. I am a 1:1 coach for the students and support them and their families through the transition process.






We weave the Skills Builder Programme throughout the whole school curriculum. The programme covers 8 essential skills: the skills are designed for success in school, home life, and employment. The Programme encompasses Communication, Creative Problem Solving, Self-Management and Collaboration Skills.

Attainment in each skill is recorded against 4 targets: Getting Started, Intermediate, Advanced and Mastery – and each level has different steps throughout. Students use these skills consistently in their work and social time, but through our rigorous feedback and review processes, students can recognise each skill, when they are utilising it, and how helpful it is to their everyday success.

The skills are taught by way of specific sessions which explains each skill and gives examples of how to develop them. Discovery Days give the students an opportunity to put these skills into practice. Across the curriculum lessons are delivered with the skills in mind. We also embed the skills through elements of our pastoral system. For example, House points are awarded in each of the skills – students are constantly identifying and developing the skills, benefitting them both academically and socially.

Each student has a Skills Builder Passport which contains their record of attainment for each component of the Skills Builder Programme. We then use this as evidence for awarding them their Undershaw Diploma - either a Bronze (Getting Started in all 8 skills), Silver (Intermediate in all 8 skills), Gold (Advanced in all 8 skills) or Platinum (Mastery in all 8 skills) award.

Our ever-popular College Campus Tours and Familiarisation Visits take our students on tours of colleges to get a real feel for how life would be in a mainstream Further Education environment.

We have excellent links with many local colleges and liaise directly with the EHCP and Additional Learning Support teams at each one.

This ensures the college personnel have everything they need at the time of transition to effectively support our young people in their further education journeys.

Our team is here to provide bespoke support to help students and their families ready themselves for the next step.

With our ideal location, we have relationships with many Further Education placements over three counties.

- Application process






