

Exam Contingency Plan



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Key staff involved in contingency planning

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Purpose of the plan

This plan examines potential risks and issues that could cause disruption to the exams process at Undershaw. By outlining actions/procedures to be invoked in case of disruption it is intended to mitigate the impact these disruptions have on our exam process.

Alongside internal processes, this plan is informed by the Ofqual (and Northern Ireland Council for the Curriculum, Examinations and Assessment) Exam system contingency plan: England, Wales and Northern Ireland which provides guidance in the publication *What schools and colleges and other centres should do if exams or other assessments are seriously disrupted* and the JCQ Joint Contingency Plan for the Examination System in England, Wales and Northern Ireland and the JCQ notice Preparing for disruption to examinations (effective from 11 October 2021).

This plan also confirms Undershaw's compliance with JCQ's **General Regulations for Approved Centres** (section 5.3) that the centre has in place:

 a written examination contingency plan which covers all aspects of examination administration. This will allow members of the senior leadership team to act immediately in the event of an emergency or staff absence. The examination contingency plan should reinforce procedures in the event of the centre being unavailable for examinations, or on results day, owing to an unforeseen emergency

Possible causes of disruption to the exam process

1. Exam officer extended absence at key points in the exam process (cycle)

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Key tasks required in the management and administration of the exam cycle not undertaken including:

Planning

- annual data collection exercise not undertaken to collate information on qualifications and awarding body specifications being delivered
- annual exams plan not produced identifying essential key tasks, key dates and deadlines
- sufficient invigilators not recruited

Entries

- awarding bodies not being informed of early/estimated entries which prompts release of early information required by teaching staff
- candidates not being entered with awarding bodies for external exams/assessment
- awarding body entry deadlines missed or late or other penalty fees being incurred

Pre-exams

- invigilators not trained or updated on changes to instructions for conducting exams
- exam timetabling, rooming allocation; and invigilation schedules not prepared
- candidates not briefed on exam timetables and awarding body information for candidates
- confidential exam/assessment materials and candidates' work not stored under required secure
- internal assessment marks and samples of candidates' work not submitted to awarding bodies/external moderators

Exam time

exams/assessments not taken under the conditions prescribed by awarding bodies



- required reports/requests not submitted to awarding bodies during exam/assessment periods, for example very late arrival, suspected malpractice, special consideration
- candidates' scripts not dispatched as required for marking to awarding bodies

Results and post-results

- access to examination results affecting the distribution of results to candidates
- the facilitation of the post-results services

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- The Head of Centre will oversee all duties of the exams officer role in the event of absence of the exams officer and DHT.
- There is a checklist for the head of centre to use to facilitate the exams; paper copies are in the safe room on the back of the door.
- If there is a prolonged period of exams officer absence, the head of centre will decide and agree
 appropriate training to ensure that another member of staff is able to perform the duties of the
 Exams Officer during a period of prolonged absence.

2. ALS lead/SENCo extended absence at key points in the exam cycle

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Key tasks required in the management and administration of the access arrangements process within the exam cycle not undertaken including:

Planning

- candidates not tested/assessed to identify potential access arrangement requirements
- centre fails to recognise its duties towards disabled candidates as defined under the terms of the Equality Act 2010
- evidence of need and evidence to support normal way of working not collated

Pre-exams

- approval for access arrangements not applied for to the awarding body
- centre-delegated arrangements not put in place
- modified paper requirements not identified in a timely manner to enable ordering to meet external deadline
- staff (facilitators) providing support to access arrangement candidates not allocated and trained

Exam time

access arrangement candidate support not arranged for exam rooms

- Access arrangements testing and admin are planned early in the academic year (November) to
 ensure that this is completed, and access arrangements are applied for and approved by the exam
 boards.
- In the event of prolonged absence of the Head of SEND, the deputy head of SEND will support to identify, test and apply for access arrangements to ensure that these are correctly completed and arrangements are put in place.



- Agreed access arrangements are promptly shared with all teaching and support staff who work
 with the students to ensure that these are routinely in place during lessons and planned exam
 preparation and mock periods/completion of NEA.
- Invigilators are informed of all AA well in advance of the exams period so that they can ensure that the appropriate agreed support is in place for every student during exams.

3. Teaching staff extended absence at key points in the exam cycle

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Key tasks not undertaken including:

Early/estimated entry information not provided to the exams officer on time; resulting in pre-release information not being received

Final entry information not provided to the exams officer on time; resulting in candidates not being entered for exams/assessments or being entered late/late or other penalty fees being charged by awarding bodies

Non-examination assessment tasks not set/issued/taken by candidates as scheduled

Candidates not being informed of centre assessed marks before marks are submitted to the awarding body and therefore not being able to consider appealing internal assessment decisions and requesting a review of the centre's marking

Internal assessment marks and candidates' work not provided to meet awarding body submission deadlines

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- All examination entries will be planned according to best practice and entries will be made in January 2025 for the summer 2025 series.
- Long term teacher absence will be planned for, with fully trained and qualified subject specialist
 cover or supply teachers teaching examination groups, so that entries are made, NEA tasks are set,
 issued and taken as scheduled.
- The examinations officer will provide training and guidance to all teachers about how and when to inform candidates of centre assessed marks.
- The examinations office will inform all candidates of the internal appeals and requesting a review of centre marking procedures.

4. Invigilators - lack of appropriately trained invigilators or invigilator absence

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Failure to recruit and train sufficient invigilators to conduct exams

Invigilator shortage on peak exam days

Invigilator absence on the day of an exam



- Identified teaching assistants will be invigilators for the exam season. All invigilators will complete the Exam Office invigilator training.
- 'Spare' invigilators will be planned for every exam so that they can step in, in the event of
 invigilator absence. They will have completed the training so are ready to invigilate.

5. Exam rooms - lack of appropriate rooms or main venues unavailable at short notice

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Exams officer unable to identify sufficient/appropriate rooms during exams timetable planning Insufficient rooms available on peak exam days

Main exam venues unavailable due to an unexpected incident at exam time

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- Exam room planning is completed as far in advance as possible, when the exam timetable is released from the exam boards.
- If Tower Road site is unavailable then the exams will be sited at the main Undershaw site. Exams
 take priority over all other activities if a room is required due to an unexpected incident. The Head
 of Centre will ensure that priority is given to examinations in the event of an unexpected incident.
 The examinations officer and head of centre will identify which rooms will be used in the event of
 this.
- If Tower Road and the main Undershaw sites are unavailable St Edmunds School
 (exams@saintedmunds.co.uk, 01428 604 808) will accommodate our students on their site. The
 head of centre will liaise with the Headteacher at St Edmunds to ensure the accommodation is
 suitable.
- Parents will be informed via email as soon as Undershaw staff are aware of a major problem with the Tower Road site and have a solution.

6. Failure of IT systems

Criteria for implementation of the plan

MIS system failure at final entry deadline

MIS system failure during exams preparation

MIS system failure at results release time

Failure of IT Systems that prevent papers being downloaded.

Cyber attack of the centre or it's data.

- The exams officer will contact exams board by telephone if required to ensure that it is known that there is an issue with IT systems. Entries will be entered manually.
- The head of centre and deputy academic can access the exam boards online and will be able to do this if the exams officer cannot.



- On the day of an exam if the IT is not working at Undershaw and Tower Road site the exams officer
 will contact St Edmunds and arrange to do any downloading and printing at the St Edmunds site.
 (exams@saintedmunds.co.uk, 01428 604 808).
- Ensure staff follow the IT guidance (reviewed annually) including the use of safe secure passwords. Multi Factor Authentication shall be used to access exam boards' websites, the authentication being completed from a device that is unique to the user and securely password protected.
- If the centre experiences a cyber attack which impacts any learner data, assessment records or learner work, the exams officer or their SLT line manager shall contact the awarding body immediately for advice and support.

7. Emergency evacuation of the exam room (or centre lock down)

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Whole centre evacuation (or lock down) during exam time due to serious incident resulting in exam candidates being unable to start, proceed with or complete their exams

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- See emergency evacuation policy.
- All invigilators to be aware of this policy and the procedures for evacuation.

8. Disruption of teaching time in the weeks before an exam – centre closed for an extended period

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Centre closed or candidates are unable to attend for an extended period during normal teaching or study supported time, interrupting the provision of normal teaching and learning

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- Where there is disruption to teaching time and students miss teaching and learning, it remains the responsibility of centres to prepare students, as usual, for examinations.
- In the case of modular courses, we may advise candidates to sit examinations in an alternative series.
- The centre has a remote learning policy which will be followed in the event of the centre closing to ensure the continuation of teaching and the effective preparation of students for examinations.

9. Candidates at risk of being unable to take examinations- centre remains open

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Candidates at risk of being unable to attend the examination centre to take examinations as normal

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

• All students who attend the centre have an individual risk assessment in place. These individual risk assessments will be used to identify and mitigate against any risks that could result in a student being unable to take an examination as normal i.e., a known medical diagnosis.



- Where appropriate, the AHT n charge of health and therapies will assist in providing guidance to meet the needs of students to sit examinations at the centre as normal, if they are considered able to do so.
- The examinations officer and head of therapies will consult with the relevant exam board to seek guidance in a situation where a student is not able to attend on site to sit an examination i.e., if they are isolating with Covid 19. The centre will follow exam board advice and guidance in the event of this preventing a student from attending an examination.
- Special consideration will be applied for where the exam board advises that this is the course of action for the centre to take if a student is not able to attend an examination.

10. Centre at risk of being unable to open as normal during the examination period

(including in the event of the centre being unavailable for examinations owing to an unforeseen emergency)

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Centre at risk of being unable to open as normal for scheduled examinations

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- In the event that the Tower Road is not available for examinations due to an unforeseen emergency, the Head of Centre will move the examination venue to the Undershaw site, where the students will sit the exams. The Head of Centre will inform the exam board of this decision.
- The Head of Centre or exams officer will inform the exam boards immediately of the nature of the emergency that has led to the centre not being available for scheduled examinations and will follow the advice and guidance from the exam board in these circumstances.
- If Tower Road and the main Undershaw sites are unavailable St Edmunds School
 (exams@saintedmunds.co.uk, 01428 604 808) will accommodate our students on their site. The
 head of Centre will liaise with the Headteacher at St Edmunds to ensure the accommodation is
 suitable.
- Parents will be informed via email as soon as Undershaw staff are aware of a major problem with the Tower Road site and have a solution.

11. Disruption in the distribution of examination papers

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Disruption to the distribution of examination papers to the centre in advance of examinations

- Awarding organisations provide centres with electronic access to examination papers via a secure
 external network. Centres would need to ensure that copies are received, made and stored under
 secure conditions and should have plans in place to facilitate such an action. Awarding
 organisations would provide guidance on the conduct of examinations in such circumstances.
- As a last resort, and in close collaboration with centres and regulators, awarding organisations to consider scheduling of the examination on an alternative date.



In an emergency situation where the secure room and the secure storage facility cannot be
accessed and the centre will need to invoke a contingency arrangement, the JCQ Centre Inspection
Service must be contacted immediately.

12. Disruption to transporting completed examination scripts

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Delay in normal collection arrangements for completed examination scripts/assessment evidence

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- The centre uses the 'yellow label' service for the collections and transportation of examination scripts.
- Where examinations are part of the national 'yellow label' service or where awarding bodies
 arrange collections, centres should contact the relevant awarding bodies for advice and
 instructions and should not make their own arrangements for transportation unless told to do so
 by the awarding body.
- The centres will ensure secure storage of completed examination scripts in the safe until collection.

13. Assessment evidence is not available to be marked

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Large scale damage to or destruction of completed examination scripts/assessment evidence before it can be marked

Completed examination scripts/assessment evidence does not reach awarding organisations

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

- The Head of Centre will contact the relevant examination board to report the damage/destruction to examination scripts or assessment evidence, and act on the guidance provided.
- Awarding organisations will generate candidate marks for affected assessments based on other appropriate evidence of candidate achievement as defined by the awarding organisations.
- Where marks cannot be generated by awarding organisations candidates may need to retake affected assessment in a subsequent assessment series.

14. Centre unable to distribute results as normal or facilitate post results services

(including in the event of the centre being unavailable on results day owing to an unforeseen emergency)

Criteria for implementation of the plan

Centre is unable to access or manage the distribution of results to candidates, or to facilitate post-results services

Centre actions to mitigate the impact of the disruption

Distribution of results:



- The centre will make arrangements to access its results at an alternative site, in agreement with the relevant awarding organisation if results cannot be distributed at the centre.
- The centre will make arrangements to coordinate access to post results services from an alternative site, sharing facilities with other centres if this is possible, in agreement with the relevant awarding organisation.

Facilitation of post results services:

- The centre will make arrangements to make post results requests at an alternative location
- The centre to contact the relevant awarding organisation if electronic post results requests are not possible.

Disruption to assessments or exams

In the absence of any instruction from the relevant awarding organisation, you should make sure that any exam or timetabled assessment takes place if it is possible to hold it. This may mean relocating to alternative premises. You should discuss alternative arrangements with your awarding organisation if:

- the exam or assessment cannot take place
- a student misses an exam or loses their assessment due to an emergency, or other event, outside of the student's control
 See also the JCQ Joint Contingency Plan for the Examination System in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

Steps you should take

Exam planning

Review contingency plans well in advance of each exam or assessment series. Consider how, if the contingency plan is invoked, you will comply with the awarding organisation's requirements.

In the event of disruption

- 1. Contact the relevant awarding organisation and follow its instructions.
- 2. Take advice, or follow instructions, from relevant local or national agencies in deciding whether your centre is able to open.



- Identify whether the exam or timetabled assessment can be sat at an alternative venue, in agreement with
 the relevant awarding organisation, ensuring the secure transportation of questions papers or assessment
 materials to the alternative venue.
- 4. Where accommodation is limited, prioritise students whose progression will be severely delayed if they do not take their exam or timetabled assessment when planned.
- 5. In the event of an evacuation during an examination please refer to JCQ's Centre emergency evacuation procedure.
- 6. Communicate with parents, carers and students any changes to the exam or assessment timetable or to the venue.
- Communicate with any external assessors or relevant third parties regarding any changes to the exam or assessment timetable.

After the exam

- 1. Consider whether any students' ability to take the assessment or demonstrate their level of attainment has been materially affected and, if so, apply for special consideration.
- 2. Advise students, where appropriate, of the opportunities to take their exam or assessment at a later date.
- 3. Ensure that scripts are stored under secure conditions.
- 4. Return scripts to awarding organisations in line with their instructions. Never make alternative arrangements for the transportation of completed exam scripts, unless told to do so by the awarding organisation.

Steps the awarding organisation should take

Exam planning

- 1. Establish and maintain, and at all times comply with, an up-to-date, written contingency plan.
- 2. Ensure that the arrangements in place with centres and other third parties enable them to deliver and award qualifications in accordance with their conditions of recognition.

In the event of disruption

- 1. Take all reasonable steps to mitigate any adverse effect, in relation to their qualifications, arising from any disruption.
- 2. Provide effective guidance to any of their centres delivering qualifications.
- 3. Ensure that where an assessment must be completed under specified conditions, students complete the assessment under those conditions (other than where any reasonable adjustments or special considerations require alternative conditions).
- 4. Promptly notify the relevant regulators about any event which could have an adverse effect on students, standards or public confidence.
- 5. Coordinate its communications with the relevant regulators where the disruption has an impact on multiple centres or a wide range of learners.

After the exam

Consider any requests for special consideration for affected students. For example, those who may have lost their internally assessed work or whose performance in assessments or exams could have been affected by the disruption.

If any students miss an exam or are disadvantaged by the disruption

If some of the students have been adversely affected by the disruption, you should ask the awarding organisation about applying for special consideration.

Decisions about special consideration, when it is or is not appropriate, is for each awarding organisation to make. Their decisions might be different for different qualifications and for different subjects.

Wider communications

The regulators, Ofqual in England, Qualifications Wales in Wales and CCEA Regulation in Northern Ireland, will share timely and accurate information, as required, with awarding organisations, government departments and other stakeholders.

The Department for Education in England, the Department of Education in Northern Ireland and the Welsh Government will inform the relevant government ministers as soon as it becomes apparent that there will be significant local or national disruption; and ensure that they are kept updated until the matter is resolved.

Awarding organisations will alert the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) and the Central Applications Office (CAO) about any impact of the disruption on their deadlines and liaise regarding student progression to further and higher education.

Awarding organisations will alert relevant professional bodies or employer groups if the impact of disruption particularly affects them.



Widespread national disruption to the taking of examinations or assessments

The governments' view across England, Wales and Northern Ireland is education should continue in 2021 to 2022 with schools remaining open and that examinations and assessments will go ahead in both autumn 2021 and summer 2022.

As education is devolved, in the event of any widespread sustained national disruption to examinations or assessments, national government departments will communicate with regulators, awarding organisations and centres prior to a public announcement. Regulators will provide advice to government departments on implications for exam timetables.

We will update this page as necessary, with any further relevant links, should national disruption occur.

JCQ

15.1 The qualification regulators, awarding bodies and government departments responsible for education have prepared and agreed information for schools and colleges in the event of examinations being seriously disrupted. This jointly agreed information will ensure consistency of response in the event of major disruption to the examinations system affecting significant numbers of candidates.

- 15.2 In addition, awarding bodies have their own well-established contingency plans in place to respond to disruptions. It is important that exams officers who are facing disruption liaise directly with the relevant awarding body/bodies.
- 15.3 Centres should prepare plans for any disruption to examinations as part of their general emergency planning. It is important to ensure that relevant centre staff are familiar with the plan. Consideration should be given as to how these arrangements will be communicated to candidates, parents and staff should disruption to examinations occur.
- 15.4 In the event that the head of centre decides the centre cannot be opened for scheduled examinations, the relevant awarding body must be informed as soon as possible. Awarding bodies will be able to offer advice regarding the alternative arrangements for conducting examinations that may be available and the options for candidates who have not been able to take scheduled examinations.
- 15.5 The awarding bodies will designate a 'contingency day' for examinations, summer 2022. This is consistent with the qualification regulators' document *Exam system contingency plan: England, Wales and Northern Ireland*: https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/exam-system-contingency-plan-england-wales-and-northern-ireland

The designation of a 'contingency day' within the common examination timetable is in the event of national or significant local disruption to examinations. It is part of the awarding bodies' standard contingency planning for examinations.

In the event of national disruption to a day of examinations in summer 2022, the awarding bodies will liaise with the qualification regulators and government departments to agree the most appropriate option for managing the impact. As a last resort the affected examinations will be rescheduled. Although every effort would be taken to keep the impact to a minimum, it is possible that there could be more than one timetable date affected following the disruption, up to and including the contingency day. Centres will be alerted if it is agreed to reschedule the examinations and the affected candidates will be expected to make themselves available in such circumstances. The decision regarding the rescheduling of examinations will always rest with the awarding body. The centre must conduct the examination on the scheduled date unless instructed to do otherwise by the awarding body.

Where candidates choose not to be available for the rescheduled examination(s) for reasons other than those traditionally covered by special consideration, they will not be eligible for enhanced grading arrangements. Centres must therefore ensure candidates and parents are aware of this contingency arrangement so that they may take it into account when making their plans for the summer. However, the awarding bodies will not insist upon candidates being available throughout the entire timetable period as a matter of course.

In the event of widespread disruption to the examination system, all centres **must** have contingency plans in place. There are three main categories of disruption, which are outlined below.

Candidates at risk of being unable to take examinations - centres remain open

Centres' contingency plans should focus on options that enable candidates to take their examinations. As part of these preparations, centres should take into account the guidance provided in the JCQ publication Instructions for conducting examinations: http://www.jcq.org.uk/exams-office/ice---instructions-for- conducting-examinations

- consider moving the starting times of the examination for all candidates (see section 6.2 of the JCQ publication Instructions for conducting examinations)
- being aware of the rules for very late arrivals (see section 21 of the JCQ publication Instructions for conducting examinations).

Wherever possible, it is always in the best interest for candidates to sit the examination. However, if candidates who are unable to sit the examination meet the criteria, special consideration through absence for acceptable reasons is an option (see **Chapter 4** of the JCQ publication A guide to the special consideration process: https://www.jcq.org.uk/exams-office/access-arrangements-and-special- consideration/regulations-and-guidance

Please do not hesitate to call the relevant awarding body if you require additional support or guidance in the event of disruption to examinations.

Centres at risk of being unable to open as normal during the examination period

As above, centres' contingency plans must focus on enabling candidates to take their examinations if the centre is at risk of being unable to open as normal.

The responsibility for deciding whether it is safe for a centre to open lies with the head of centre who is responsible for taking advice or following instructions from relevant local or national agencies.

Special consideration through absence for acceptable reasons is also available as an option if all other avenues have been exhausted and candidates meet the relevant criteria.

Please do not hesitate to call the relevant awarding body if you require additional support or guidance in the event of disruption to your examinations.

Disruption to transporting completed examination scripts

If there is a delay in normal collection arrangements for completed examination scripts:

- where examinations are part of the national 'yellow label' service or where awarding bodies arrange collections, centres should **contact the relevant awarding bodies** for advice and instructions.
- for examinations where centres make their own collection arrangements, they should investigate alternative
 options that comply with the JCQ publication Instructions for conducting examinations
- completed scripts must be stored securely until they are collected.

Summary of centre and awarding body responsibilities

Examination centres are responsible for:

- preparing plans for any disruption to examinations as part of centres' general emergency planning deciding
 whether the centre can open for examinations as scheduled and informing relevant awarding bodies if the centre is
 unable to open
- exploring the opportunities for alternative arrangements if the centre cannot open for examinations and agreeing such arrangements with the awarding bodies
- judging whether candidates meet the requirements for special consideration because of any disruption and submitting these requests to the relevant awarding bodies
- assessing their circumstances and liaising with awarding bodies in the event of disruption to the transportation of papers.

Awarding bodies are responsible for:

• ensuring centres receive examination materials for scheduled examinations



- advising centres on possible alternative examination arrangements and declining/approving proposals for alternative examination arrangements
- evaluating and declining/approving requests for special consideration.
